In English and Maths, progress is measured from each student's Yr 6 (Key Stage 2) SAT mark to the current day. In the Summer of 2016, the KS2 tests were changed and SAT papers were marked with a number rather than a level. At Ecclesfield School, we have set a minimum expectation for progress called a 'minimum learning lane', however students are all encouraged to be the best they can be and should strive to meet the highest possible criteria. Where a student's work sustainably meets the criteria of a learning lane higher than the one they have been set, their learning lane will be adjusted upwards.

This student achieved a scaled score of 104 in their Yr 6 English reading test. In the first instance, the minimum expectation is for this student to work within the expectations of the ADVANCE learning lane in English which would see them 'WORKING BEYOND' agerelated expectations and if they stay in this learning lane throughout Years 7-9, should put them in a position to achieve at least a GCSE grade 6.

This student achieved a scaled score of 110 in their Yr 6 Maths test. In the first instance, the minimum expectation is for this student to work within the expectations of the EXCEL learning lane in Maths which would see them 'EXCEEDING' age-related expectations and if they stay in this learning lane throughout Years 7-9, should put them in a position to achieve at least a GCSE grade 7.

The Teacher will award a 'current learning lane' which is the teacher's current assessment of your child's work. For each learning lane there is a set of criteria which students are expected to demonstrate in their work.

This student is 'making less than expected progress' in English because their teacher has assessed them as working in the ASPIRE learning lane (which is two lanes below their minimum learning lane, ADVANCE).

In Maths the student is 'making expected progress' because their teacher's assessment is the same as their minimum learning lane.

Given the increased rigour and content of the newly reformed 9-1 GCSEs from 2017 onwards, a number of students in Year 7 at this stage may he that progrem is less than expected' (which means that they are working at least one learning lane below expectation) and not yet on track to meet the government's raised expectations. The schemes of learning have been significantly changed to address the new requirements and prepare students thoroughly for the 2021 exams. If "intervention is required" (meaning that your child is working more than two learning lanes below expected progress) please do not hesitate to contact your child's class teacher so that specific learning targets can be discussed in order to secure more rapid progress.

In all other subjects, teachers assess students' achievement in lessons using criteria based on age-related expectations. For example, a student who is 'Working BEYOND' is achieving expectations <u>beyond</u> that of an average Year 7 student.
