

Dear parent/carer

I am Lindsey Butterfield, Assistant Chief Constable at South Yorkshire Police. I am writing to you following the tragedy at All Saints Catholic High School in Sheffield, where 15-year-old pupil Harvey Willgoose was fatally stabbed.

As a police officer, and also as a parent, my heart goes out to Harvey's family and all those affected by this devastating incident. I know the concern and distress this will cause to our wider communities in South Yorkshire, particularly among families with teenagers and young children.

It is likely the recent events will spark conversations and questions at home about knife crime. These may be difficult, but are crucial conversations to have if we are to change perspectives around knife carrying and knife crime.

Perhaps your child has spoken about feeling scared or fearful of knife crime in the wake of what has happened, or maybe you are worried your son or daughter is being pressured into dangerous situations. There is advice and support available for you and your family, as you navigate through this.
